Snow Removal 2019

This is an update, since many of our residents were not here for our last snow season.

The contractor, NEPA Snowplowing, has agreed to the following:

- Mailboxes and fire hydrants will be cleared as soon as the roadways are plowed, but before driveways and sidewalks.
- Road, mailboxes and fire hydrants will always be kept cleared so the mail can be delivered.
- A poly blade, not a metal blade, will be used on driveways unless directed by the association, to prevent damage to driveways.
- Rock salt will be used on driveways, calcium chloride on the sidewalks.

In order for our snow removal contractor to provide the best possible service, please adhere to the following:

- During a snow or ice event, there should be no vehicles, including visitors' cars, parked on the main road.
- The contractor will not clean off cars in driveways in order to minimize accidental bumps or scratches to vehicles.
- If you own a pet and you do not want the sidewalks and driveways salted, please let the snow committee know, using the email address below.
- No snow should be shoveled onto the road at any time for any reason.

Any concerns should be emailed to the Snow Removal Committee at poasnowremoval@gmail.com. Please include your Unit number and specific concern when emailing.

As stated in Article VIII Committees, Section 7 of the By-Laws, any rules approved by the Committee and the Executive Board, shall be mandatory for all members of the Association.

SOUTH ABINGTON WOODS CHECKLIST WHEN LEAVING HOME IN THE COLD MONTHS

- 1. Disconnect all hoses from the hose connections and drain water from hoses. Even though the hose connections are freeze resistant, if the hoses are not removed, the water will not drain and freezing will occur. This will cause considerable damage to the plumbing and also the interior of your home.
- 2. Set heat at 58 degrees.
- 3. Unplug hot water heater from the outlet.
- 4. Open all cabinet doors in vanities and under kitchen sink.
- 5. Make sure all interior doors are left open (closets, baths, powder rooms, etc.)
- 6. Turn off water supply in foyer closet by turning the valve a ¼ turn on the yellow handled valve. Make sure foyer closet doors are left open.
- 7. Install new furnace filter prior to departure.
- 8. Turn off the ice maker in the refrigerator.
- 9. Have a neighbor or friend check on the house, especially in times of extreme cold.

Even during the warmer weather, when leaving home, it is a good idea to turn off water supply in the foyer closet.

HVAC - SUMMER AND WINTER BALANCING

The dampers are marked in the mechanical room. The dampers should be set to summer mode upon the need for air conditioning. Also, set to winter mode when heating is required.

Valley HVAC provides this service of damper balancing in their yearly, optional service contract. The service contract includes two visits (one at the start of the heating season and one at the start of the cooling season). The service contract is STRONGLY encouraged after the original warranty period has expired.

Also, please note once your warranty has expired, Valley HVAC will not respond to a service call during a busy time (heat wave or period of extended cold) if you do not have the service agreement.

In the event of a service call by any of the contractors, after the warranty has expired, the home owner will be charged an additional fee for a service call for nights and weekends. Therefore, if a service call can be performed during business hours of Monday – Friday; it will be much more economical.

HOSES

Disconnect all hoses once temperatures begin to drop near freezing. Although we have installed non-freeze hose bibs, if the hose is left connected, the water cannot drain. It will freeze and cause major damage.

HEATING AND AIR CONDINTIONING FILTERS

This filter should be changed monthly. The size of the filter is 16" X 25". The fiberglass filters (cheapest) work best. They are very economical and help extend equipment life in addition to indoor air quality.

HOT WATER HEATERS

Many units have the conventional hot water tank type heaters. These heaters have a 5 year warranty and expansion tanks only one year. The average life span of a hot water heater is 7 years. It is STRONGLY recommended that the hot water heater, the expansion tank, (which is located above the hot water heater) and associated piping, be inspected at least monthly. Monitor for minor drips and/or excessive corrosion.

SMOKE ALARMS AND CO DETECTORS

All smoke alarms are electrically powered with a 9V battery back-up. This back-up is to provide you with smoke detection even in the event of a power outage. These 9V batteries must be changed as recommended by the manufacturer. In the event that one battery fails, it is STRONGLY advised that all batteries be changed at that time. Please make sure you check your home for all alarms since there are many alarms installed with-in the home.

STORM DOORS

Any resident that had a storm door installed, it is required that in the summer months of April thru October the full glass not be left in place in the storm door. The full glass in the storm door magnifies the sun rays, and coupled with the seal of the door, traps the heat between the storm door and the exterior door. Temperature of the front exterior door in the afternoon sun light with full glass in place has exceeded 200 degrees. Paint has blistered on these exterior doors; also these doors have sustained damage due to the excessive heat buildup.

All residents should either have the glass removed and the screen installed, or those with the screens within the door should allow the half screen for proper ventilation to reduce the effects of solar gain and heat buildup. It should also be noted, when removing the full glass panel on the storm door do not store the glass panel against the siding even for a short time since the glass will magnify the sun rays and cause damage to the siding or surround surfaces.

Please note, all screen doors were installed by the Homeowners or a subcontractor chosen by the homeowner and not the developer. Therefore, any damages sustained by these doors which were installed outside of the contract between the Homeowner and the Developer shall not be the responsibility of the Developer or the Property Owners Association. Also, we must remember that any repair to a storm door is the Homeowner's responsibility and not that of the Property Owners Association.




