United States Presidential Election Tuesday, November 3, 2020

Thanks to historic legislation passed last fall, all Pennsylvania voters now also have the ability to vote by mail without having to provide an excuse, for any reason or no reason at all.

Voting by Mail-in or Absentee Ballot

In Pennsylvania, you now have two options for mail ballots. You may either choose a mail-in ballot or an absentee ballot to request, complete, and return to your <u>county election office</u>.

- •Mail-in ballot Any qualified voter may apply for a mail-in ballot. You may simply request this ballot without a reason.
- •Absentee ballot If you plan to be out of the municipality on election day or if you have a disability or illness, you should request this ballot type, which still requires you to list a reason for your ballot.

In order to request either ballot type, you must be registered to vote. Please visit <u>Check Your Registration Status</u> to review your registration information

Mail-in and absentee ballot applications for the November 3, 2020, general election must be received by your <u>county election office</u> or other designated location by 5:00 p.m. on Tuesday, October 27, 2020.

I served in the Air Force from 1972-1976. I was a field engineer for SAC (strategic air command).

My position enabled me to part of a team launching ICBM test (intercontinental ballistic missiles) missiles from Vandenberg AFB (Lompoc, Calif) to a lagoon a few thousand miles out into the Pacific Ocean.

My main base of operation was Ellsworth AFB, near Rapid City, S.D. (35 miles from Mt. Rushmore) where we maintained 150 underground missile silos making sure these ground based missiles were on constant alert status to protect our country from incoming attacks.

For me, it was an honor to serve, and I made some long lasting friendships that are still current to this day.

The scenic route follows a portion of the former Lackawanna & Wyoming Valley (Laurel Line) Railroad right-of-way as it parallels Roaring Brook proceeds past the Historic Iron Furnaces and continues through the Crown Avenue Tunnel, at 4747 feet long, one of the longest interurban tunnels ever built. Proceed to PNC Field, home of the SWB RailRiders, on Montage Mountain, where you'll prepare for your return ride back the Trolley Museum.

During the operating season, the trolley excursion will depart from the main passenger platform of the Steamtown National Historic Site.
