

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4 Surprising Things Your Phone Can Do

Your Phone Can Read to You: Many models can read the content on your screen out loud, whether it's a text, an email or a newspaper article.

On an iPhone: Go to Settings > Accessibility > Spoken Content > Speak Selection. Once enabled, you can highlight text and click the Speak button. If you have Speak Screen enabled, you can have the whole screen read to you by swiping down with two fingers or you can ask Siri to "speak screen."

On an Android: Go to Settings > Accessibility > Select to Speak. Depending on your model, a small icon of a person or speech bubble will appear on the screen in any app; just tap it.

It Can Tell Friends Where You Are: Want people to find you in a large park or at a bustling tourist attraction? Your phone can send a map via text message that pinpoints your exact location for them.

On an iPhone: Open a text message, tap the profile of the sender at the top of the screen. Then tap Send My Current Location.

On an Android: Open Google Maps, press and hold your finger on your current location until a card listing the address where you are pops up. Then tap Share > Messages to send your location via text message.

It Can Magnify Everything for You: Need help reading that tiny type on a prescription label or a restaurant menu? Your phone can magnify written text for easier reading.

On an iPhone: Go to Settings > Accessibility > Accessibility Shortcut > Magnifier. To activate the magnifier, click the Side button three times. Then drag the slider to zoon in or out.

On an Android: Open your phone's camera and point it at what you want to magnify. Then place two fingers on the screen and slowly spread them outward to zoom in on the text you want to enlarge.

It Can Replace a Measuring Tape: Your phone can measure any object using its camera. It can also be a carpenter's level.

On an iPhone: Open the Measure app. Move the dot over the starting point and tap the plus (+) sign, then tap it again after you've moved the dot to the end point to see what the measurement is. For the level function, tap the word "level" in the bottom right corner of the app and use your phone like you would a regular level.

On an Android: Android does not have this feature built in, but you can download a free third-party app like AR Ruler or Moasure to access similar tools.

Is It Really So Bad to Write Down My Passwords?

IT DEPENDS. If you're in a shared space, like an office, where someone might easily come across your list of passwords, it's not a good idea.




Keeping passwords in a more secure spot, like written in a notebook that's locked in a drawer or a safe, is less risky, but it still puts you at some risk.

A secure handwritten list is also better than memorizing and reusing one password for all of your accounts. In fact, the most important thing for password security is that you have complex, distinct passwords for each and every account. That's because if any one account gets hacked, all your accounts with the same password become vulnerable, too. (If a company you have an account with gets hacked, change your password and never reuse it).

Probably one of the easiest and most secure ways to store passwords is to use a password manager, such as IPassword, which has earned excellent scores for ease of use and security in Consumer Reports tests. Password managers create new and complex passwords for each of your online accounts, storing them in a digital vault protected by a single primary password.

To help keep your account safe set up multifactor authentication (a second proof of identity, like a one-time code sent to you via email).

Homemade Pumpkin Spice Latte

2 cups milk (dairy or non-dairy)
2 tablespoons pumpkin puree, or more to taste
1 to 3 tablespoons sugar, depending on how sweet you like it
1 tablespoon vanilla extract
½ teaspoon pumpkin pie spice, plus more for serving
½ cup strong hot coffee
Whipped cream, for serving



Add milk, pumpkin puree, and sugar to a saucepan over medium heat. Heat until hot, but do not boil. Remove the saucepan from the heat and whisk in the vanilla, pumpkin pie spice, and the coffee.

Divide the mixture between two mugs. Top with whipped cream and a sprinkle of pumpkin pie spice.

For more of a pumpkin taste, cook the pumpkin puree down before adding it to the milk mixture. Simmer it until reduced by one-third; this way, the pumpkin flavor will concentrate

Maple Cinnamon Latte

A cozy fall drink made for lazy Sunday mornings.

3/4 cup milk

½ cup coffee (brewed as strong as you like)

1 - 1 ½ tbsp maple syrup

1/4 tsp cinnamon, plus more for garnish

Cinnamon stick, for garnish (optional)



Pour milk into a medium-sized mason jar and screw on the lid. Shake for 10-15 seconds until foam starts to form at the top. Remove lid and microwave jar for about 45 seconds or until milk is hot to the touch and foamy. Keep an eye on the milk as you microwave to keep it from bubbling.

Pour hot coffee into a mug and stir in the maple syrup and cinnamon. Top with milk, spooning the foam onto the top. Sprinkle with cinnamon and serve with a cinnamon stick, if desired.


Shane was a writer on Comedy Central's Delco Proper and co-created, wrote, and starred in the YouTube hit sketch series Gilly & Keeves.
