Many residents (and pets) enjoy walks during the day and night. Please be aware of pedestrians at all times and remind your visitors of the speed limit in our neighborhood.

When driving, help keep pedestrians of all ages safe.

Watch for pedestrians at all times and be extra cautious when backing up.

Stay alert – avoid distracted driving.

When walking, don't wear dark clothing. Wear reflective gear. Athletic stores offer sashes, clothing lines or badges that have reflective material on them so you can be more easily seen.

Put your phone away while walking Over half of distracted walking injuries occur in our own homes, proving that we need to stay aware of our surroundings whether indoors and out.

Walk against traffic. Just as important as it is for oncoming traffic to see you, it's important for you to also see oncoming traffic. It helps you make sure you stay in the clear in case others on the street aren't aware of your presence.

Be aware. Keeping your head up and ears open while walking in the dark will help keep you safe from surprises, like other pedestrians, animals or traffic that might come out of nowhere. It may also show any onlookers that you are paying attention to your surroundings and prepared to act if necessary.

COVID-19

I'm up to five COVID boosters...should I really be signing up for yet another shot now?

Yes. If you didn't get a COVID vaccine this fall, you need to hustle and catch up.

The most recent shot, which was released in September 2023, isn't actually a booster. It's a new vaccine that targets the latest variants. So even if you got the previous booster, you're not fully protected from the current versions of the virus.

Researchers who study the virus predict that COVID will continue to circulate throughout the winter, along with flu, RSV and other viruses that send hundreds of thousands of older adults to the hospital each year.

"One thing that we've learned over the past three and a half years is that the coronavirus isn't a seasonal virus like the flu is. It's with us constantly," says David Montefiori, director of the Laboratory for AIDS Vaccine Research and Development at Duke University Medical Center. "And as immunity wanes in the population, we're going to continue to see increased numbers of infections and associated increases in hospitalizations and deaths."

The coronavirus vaccine could become an annual shot, like the influenza vaccine. Researchers are even working on a combined COVID-flu vaccine, so a few years from now, a single shot from your doctor or pharmacy may be all you need to protect yourself fully. -- RN



South Abington Township Refuse and Recycling Info Sheet

Due to a growing problem with bed bugs, all mattresses and box springs must be wrapped with plastic before collection.

SOUTH ABINGTON TOWNSHIP has contracted with <u>JP Mascaro & Sons</u> for refuse and recycling pickup. The service may only be activated by calling the Township office, 570-586-2111 X 1.

The quarterly trash fee is \$89.88 and billed by JP Mascaro. Please contact the office to inquire about the requirements for Senior Citizen and Low Income rates. Various forms can be found below.

Six major holidays will postpone a normal scheduled day to the following day ONLY if they fall on a weekday. The holidays are as follows: *New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving and Christmas*. If any holiday falls on a weekend, your regular day will NOT change.

Also be advised, as per the contract, J P Mascaro may pull their trucks due to inclement weather for the safety of their employees and the general public. They will return once able to do so safely on the next available business day.

SOUTH ABINGTON TOWNSHIP is a mandated recycling community under Pennsylvania Act 101. Residential establishments must recycle newspaper, glass, aluminum, bi-metallic containers and plastics. Please place all items at the curb the evening before your scheduled pick-up day after 5:00 PM.

Refuse & Recycling Info Sheet

CFL bulbs (small round/curly only) may be dropped off at the Township Building during regular office hours. The energy saving bulbs have small amounts of mercury that should not be introduced into the waste stream.


Corrugated cardboard dumpsters are located along the township garage access driveway near Quality Pools. The dumpsters are clearly marked for the acceptable contents for each. Residents are **strongly encouraged** to place their recycling outside their home as the dumpsters are a benefit to the businesses located within the township.

As a Pennsylvania mandated recycling municipality, all businesses must recycle, at the minimum, aluminum, high grade office paper and cardboard. A Recycling Report must be submitted each year to the Township, accompanied by certified weight slips. Helpful information for commercial recycling can be found below
